8. Same as Sample's Tavern, where Washington stopped in 1770; and pronounced it a very good house of entertainment.

11. Redoubt, built by Colonel Grant, 1763; prior to the Revolution a log addition was made to it. John Neville occupied it after the Whisky Insurrection until he bought it No. 9 on this map.

12. Boat-yard.
13. Ab. Kirkpatrick.
14. James O'Hara.
15. Old Fort Pitt, a slight work, composed of pickets, with a shallow and narrow ditch, hastily thrown up in winter of 1758 for the reception of two hundred and twenty men.
16. Fort Pitt. Built in the summer of 1759 by General Stanwix. Captain Gordon was probably the engineer who superintended the work. Washington visited this place in 1770, and in his journal of the 17th of October mentions that the sides next to the country are of brick and the others of stone. The brick alluded to were those in the wall which

supported the rampart. The rest was not merely a stockade, but included also a rampart of earth thrown up, but being unsupported by a wall assumed its natural slope.
