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Neill Log House Dedicated

An old-fashioned box lunch was followed by a concert of Pittsburgh folk songs by the Robert Schmertz group. The Junior League arranged the furnishings in the house and decorated it very appropriately for opening day and our Urban Corps students served as guides. The Department of Parks & Recreation provided a beautiful green lawn and tables and chairs; the mayor, who had planned to come, telephoned to say he had been suddenly called out of town but sent his congratulations. We are very proud of our work at the Neill Log House which was done under a grant of \$50,000 from the Richard King Mellon Foundation because this preserves one of the last of three extant buildings from the eighteenth century within the city limits of Pittsburgh. The house will be open during summer months on Tuesday, Thursday, and Sunday afternoons from 1:00 to 4:00 pm. Free admission.

PRE-CHRISTMAS SALE



Admission is free to all members.

Shown here is a new red and white candystripped awning that we have added to our
restored building at 1705 East Carson
Street. Recently with a \$50,000 grant
from the Sarah Mellon Scaife Foundation
we restored this structure as a threeunit apartment building and retained the
Economy Meat Market below. We added the
awning to show the neighboring merchants
how awnings could make the street look
more lively and also cool the pedestrian
on a hot summer afternoon.



Our members will be pleased to hear that another historic building has been saved from an uncertain fate and is being preserved; the 150 year old Fulton Log Cabin will be restored by its new owners, the Upper St. Clair Township and school district. Formerly owned by the late Congressman James G. Fulton,

FULTON LOG HOUSE SAVED the cabin may date from the 1820s and is one of the few log cabins remaining in the area. The land was bought by the Fulton family in 1912 and James F. Fultor, father of the late

Congressman, made it a summer retreat by adding wings to the house. Fire destroyed all the additions but, fortunately, did not harm the original structure. The township will now try to restore the cabin, with the aid of federal funds and private contributions from the community, as a museum and a meeting place for civic groups. PHLF took part in the protracted negotiations about the fate of the house after Congressman Fulton's untimely death.









In early August a one-day fair was organized by the YWCA. Various organizations including the Mexican War Streets Society and PHLF MEXICAN WAR set up booths on Pesaca Place to sell toys, food, balloons, and trivia. A band played on the dais and children engaged in pinata, Mexican fashion, taking turns trying to knock

open an animal stuffed with toys while blind-folded. For the Mexican War Streets Society booth a great sombrero was constructed. Highlight of the day came when the new Mexican War Streets identification signs installed by the City and paid for by PHLF were dedicated.

On Sunday, November 12, at 2:00 p.m. the Old Post Office Museum will present an exhibition of art, featuring the beautiful and extraordinary decoupage of Mrs. Laura Goldsmith. Mrs. Goldsmith's work is very well known and Donald Miller, art critic of the <u>Post-Gazette</u>, feels that her decoupage is the finest of its kind. He highly recommends this exhibition.

The decoupage will be on display until 5 p.m. and also for a short time the following Monday evening after the lecture of Charles van Ravenswaay. Mrs. Goldsmith will be present to answer questions and to comment on the art of decoupage on both Sunday and Monday. Members are invited and refreshments will be served.

THE PRESENT COSTUME EXHIBITION





The largest exhibition yet mounted by the Museum since its opening exhibition (devoted to the architecture of Allegheny County), this is a selection from a large collection of costumes and costume accessories recently donated to PHLF by Carnegie-Mellon University. Occupying the entire main floor of the Rotunda, it was opened by a preview party on Monday 26 June, at which time the collection was officially presented to our President, Charles Covert Arensberg, by Professor Betty J. Lloyd of Carnegie-Mellon University.

The collection, consisting of some five hundred costume items, was begun by the late Virginia M. Alexander (head of the costume economics department of the Margaret Morrison Carnegie College of Carnegie-Mellon University) in the early 1930s as a teaching device. Augmented extensively over the years by generous donors, its holdings now constitute a comprehensive history of Western fashion over the last one hundred fifty years with special emphasis on Pittsburgh. Recently when the collection along with its parent department was "phased out" by Carnegie-Mellon University, it was donated to the Museum through the efforts of Professor Emerita Helen T. Robinson and the Fashion Group of Pittsburgh.

The Museum's costume holdings--our largest single collection--has thus been much enlarged and it now consists of about one thousand items. Through the efforts of Bess Kimberly and Virginia Trimble of the Fashion Group, the collection is now being catalogued and conserved.

The current exhibition, due to the interest of Fashion Group and our staff, has been one of our most colorful and popular activities. Here the "see-through" dress of about 1810 prefaces a whole kaleidescope of gowns, hats, coats, fans, parasols, shawls, scarves--you name it--we have it! For anyone interested in clothes (and who isn't?), the viewing of this exhibition is a "must".

The Henninger "log cabin" in Fox Chapel is for sale. The cabin stands in an ideal setting on 13 acres of beautiful forest. The cabin is over 200 years old and is virtually unaltered from its original form. It is in excellent condition and is really a magnificent sight to behold!
